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

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Philadelphia march 20 1493 Dear Friends What or how can we make amonis to you, for what you have done for us and for our Town in Jending those Books to the Children, Jurely you have thewn us very great kindthe fullness thereof, it is he that puts into the Hearts of his Teople to give liberally unto us poor Indians . -Thanks be to God for his goodness towards is, in me ferving and maintaining ust but about all that we prome born in Christian Land, that we might hear and know the wonderfull works of God, for our immortal Souls, and that we and many of our prior definited Nation have experience the Love of God and to enjoy that leave and joy unto our Jouls which the word connot give nor take away - he thank you for the Javours we have neceive from your hand, - we hope, God will neward you for it - and of have put many Books into my hand, I shall esever wow to get them up to our Settlement and get the School going as a quick as we can - I alle will let. tyou know what proficiency the will make. this Summer this is from your friend and Brother David Fowler

ytf An Indian Settlement at a town called Brotherton in theytf Oneida Country consisting of various tribes from New England & some fromytf Long Island; consisting in the whole of 26 families--and 113ytf Parsons--distance from Albany abs 110 miles--the all speak English, theyytf profess themselves to be Baptists , they have aytf Meeting House which is also used for a School, where 25 Children areytf taught to read write & Arithmetic, the teacher is a young married manytf who gives satisfaction in his employmentytf
